## **OBJECTIVES**

LS 211 —a third-semester Spanish course— embodies a task-oriented approach to language learning. It has been designed to help students develop proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing in Spanish. It also aims to prepare the student to gain a more complex understanding of the various cultures that make up the Spanish-speaking world. The class is conducted in Spanish.

The course will expose students to a variety of cultural practices in the Spanishspeaking world with the aim of understanding cultural differences and drawing comparisons between them. If a student attends all classes and completes all of the coursework, they will be able to meet the following learning outcomes:

#### Unit 1:

Describe **personal relationships** in the US as well as in Hispanic cultures. Describe relationships between the generations and the perspectives of older people. Interpret authentic readings and videos about personal relationships in the Hispanic world. Make recommendations regarding relationships. Start and maintain conversations with people they have not met before. Interview others and report on their personal relationships.

## Unit 2:

Describe potential consequences of **technological innovations and geographical explorations** in the Hispanic world. Express opinions about the advantages and disadvantages of technology. Hypothesize about future technology and how it will shape the world. Explore globalization and cultural heritage.

Students will achieve these goals through:

- Active participation in the learning process. Students will engage in intensive daily practice of vocabulary and grammatical structures within a conversational context, both in and outside class. Both in-class activities and homework will provide a communicative, learner-centered, task-based approach.
- Homework. The homework and tasks will consist in essential instructional content. Most of the time, students will be introduced to the learning material before class, then classroom time will be used to deepen learning and understanding of these concepts. Students will create video-blogs, prepare two oral presentations, read articles, watch a Spanish movie, write a movie review, write a CV/resumé and a cover letter, etc.
- Readings (cuentos literarios y fragmentos teatrales), short films and movies designed to provide students with more practice with grammatical structures while broadening vocabulary and cultural knowledge.

#### **ASSESSMENT**

## Homework and class participation

As stated before, homework and class participation are key in this course. Students should always come to class prepared and actively participate in all activities, tasks and discussions. During the semester, students will receive three homework and participation grades to help assess their in-class performance (preparation, classroom interaction, teamwork, and participation).

## Compositions

Students will have to write two compositions. They will be reviewed by the instructor, and they will then need to send a final version incorporating all the corrections and taking the instructor's feedback into consideration.

#### **Tests and Oral Presentations**

One 1-hour test (prueba) will be given during the course. It will consist of an oral section, vocabulary, specific grammar points, and a composition. During the semester, students will prepare, following the instructor's guidelines, two oral presentations. Use of media is required.

#### **Mid-Term and Final Exam**

The Mid-Term exam (examen parcial) is a one-hour exam and will be based on the vocabulary, grammar, movies and readings covered in class up until the exam.

The LS 211 final (examen final) is a two-hour exam based on the vocabulary, grammar, movies and readings covered during the semester. More details about the material tested in the final exam will be given in class.
