




Luke Glowacki was featured in the <u>On Humans Podcast</u> discussing evidence for the role of war in human evolution.





'Genderless souls?: Sufi women in sociopolitical contexts'

Sufism is a porous phenomenon that could be described with the categories of mysticism, esotericism, spirituality, and popular religion within the Islamic tradition. Sufism has been both at the centre of Islamic orthodoxy and morality, with many Sufis shaping Islamic institutions and doctrines across time and space, and at its margins, with Sufis challenging orthodoxy and social norms, reinventing rituals, and promoting blended practices based on visions, dreams, and ecstasy. One can think of the relationship between Sufism and Islam as two overlapping traditions, generally overlapping sometimes distancing, and rarely separated (e.g. non-Islamic Sufism of Abraham Maimonides and

STUDENT FIELDWORK

Alexander Dorr has been identifying and analyzing fauna from the Hellenistic sites of Tel Shimron and Kedesh while staying in East Jerusalem at the W.F. Albright Institute. In February, he gave a public lecture on the fauna from Kedesh, and how animal economy and provisioning at the site remained stable despite the historical and archaeological record suggesting dynamic changes in rule in the region.





Sarah Lewinger is currently in Kampala, Uganda. Embedded in a community of predominantly Gen Z poets, she is studying how young people use poetry and performance to navigate political expression and create meaning and (sometimes) solidarity under conditions of increasing state surveillance and repression.

Warrenkevin Henderson was at the Smithsonian National Museum of Natural History last semester scanning skulls of bears, pinnipeds, and horses. To the left are two of his favorite photos: one in which he compared the size of his head to that of a walrus; the other is of the recently extinct Caribbean Monk Seal--"a powerful reminder of what happens when humans take too much."





Dr. Steven Schwartz is an Assistant Professor of Anthropology at Boston University. He is an environmental anthropologist with expertise in political ecology, resource extraction, and indigeneity. His research explores how the climate crisis and the global rise of renewable energy intersect with Indigenous peoples' environmental relations, practices of resistance, and political and economic life in Latin America.

Wind Futures: Indigeneity, Aerial Worlds, and the Making of
Renewable Energy in Colombia, Steven's upcoming book,
details his research in La Guajira, a peninsula that is the center of
a wind energy rush in Colombia and comprises part of the ancestral
territory of the Wayuu Indigenous people. With knowledge gained from
18 months of ethnographic fieldwork, he explores how frontline
communities, energy workers, and state bureaucrats
negotiate and experience the shift from coal mining to wind
farming. The book documents new struggles over wind, land,
and the future that seek to redefine the meaning of a "just" energy
transition beyond state and corporate desires.

Dr. Schwartz is also developing a second book that investigates what ideas, practices, and imaginaries of environmental care, post-carbon life, and eco-social justice are emerging among groups living near petrochemical ruins and oil regions in Colombia and Venezuela. His research has been supported by the Social Science Research Council, the Wenner-Gren, Tinker, and Mellon

Foundations, among others.


















Professor Cunningham is an interdisciplinary anthropologist specifically interested in the patterns of variation that existed for enslaved people in regions that are not traditionally placed in dialogue (currently the Caribbean, South Atlantic Ocean, and Indian Ocean). Her research also examines the ways that these sites of the slave trade can be used to reimagine theory and practice around heritage preservation and community engagement. An expert in bioarchaeology, Cunningham uses her research to uncover the forgotten stories of enslaved peoples and truths about the slave trade that have been omitted by slavers.

The Histories of Enslaved People Were Written by Slavers. A BU Researcher Is Working to Change That, is a profile about Andree and her research in the BU Brink that highlights her commitment to expanding ethical research practices-an effort she has brought to BU via the Anthropology Teaching Collection Curation Project, which traces BU's hazy history of acquisition for its own collection of human remains.



"Any sort of burial work, especially in an African diaspora context, should be done with community. I now see it as ancestor work to do any sort of work related to burial grounds. And to do that—that's something that has to be grounded beyond a discipline."


